2018 ANNUAL PARTICIPATION REPORT

In 2018, the City of Petoskey, through its Department of Parks and Recreation, offered to the community twenty-eight (28) organized youth and adult recreational programs.

Of these 28 programs conducted in 2018, nine programs were designed specifically for adults, six programs for youth and adults, and 13 for youth and early teens. Examples of mixed youth and adult programs include snowboarding and ski lessons, tennis, disc golf, etc. In 2018, there were 3,275 registered participants involved in these programs, slightly below the 3,476 participants in 2017.

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

Men's League Basketball (Adult): This program has merged the old independent league men's program into a hybrid league composed of mixed adult age players. This program had 81 players in 2018, up from 70 in 2017.

Men's 40+ Basketball (Adult): Program participation in this age category was not kept in 2018. Department decided to make this a free, drop in, open gym style format as opposed to a semi-organized league consisting of about 30 players in 2017.

Boys' Basketball: Participation had an increase from 76 to 85 in 2018, and remains a very stable program. Travel basketball teams continue to expand into the lower grades and is effecting program participation. The YMCA is now running a K-2 league and it will be interesting to see the long-term effects on our 3-6 grade programs.

Girls' Basketball: The girls program had 39 girls participating in 2018, up from 36 in 2017. Independent travel teams are impacting this program, especially at the 5th and 6th grade level, but numbers seem to be leveling off and growing with the direct involvement of the PHS Girls Varsity Basketball Coaching staff and players.

Day Camp: Last year day camp numbers took another rise in participants, from 633 in 2017 to 645 in 2018. Staff attributes this to a number of factors including camp leadership, staffing and the addition of organized day and field trips.

Youth Baseball/Softball/T-Ball: In 2018, the youth diamond program had 480 participants compared to 494 in 2017. The minor and major league girls' softball programs dropped to 91 girls participating, down from 121 in 2017. The T-Ball program gained a few participants, from 58 in 2017 to 61 participants in 2018. Much of this decline in girl's numbers is attributed to the expanding number of travel teams with varying ages and divisions.

Adult Softball: The adult men's and women's fast pitch and co-ed church slow pitch leagues combined for a total of 277 participants, down slightly from 285 participants in 2017. The women's fast pitch program decreased by five players, the men's fast pitch program decreased by 20 players (due to fewer teams) and the co-ed church league slow pitch leagues increased by 17 players.

Flag Football: In 2018, the flag football program had 71 participants compared to 79 in 2017. This program remains popular, steady and consistent from year to year.

Soccer: In 2018, participation within the soccer program was 619, up from 593 participants in 2017. The soccer programs remained stable, the women's program increased by three players and the spring and fall soccer programs increased by 23 players.

Tennis: Tennis continues to remain popular with the guidance of Brian Forster, our tennis professional, who replaced Dree Lo when she retired in 2015. In 2018, there were 182 participants involved in our various tennis sessions, down from 239 in 2017, as we refocus programs on younger participants & look to add a high school aged program in 2019.

Ski/Snowboard Lessons: Ski lessons, offered in conjunction with the Nubs Nob Winter Sports School, provided recreational skiing and snowboarding lessons to 82 participants in 2018, up from 81 in 2017. Ski lessons account for 72% of lessons provided with snowboard lessons accounting for 28%, approximately the same break down from last season.

Ice Skating/Speed Skating Lessons: Figure skating lessons had 61 participants for 2018, which is the same number of participants as the previous season. Speed Skating Program remained steady at 20 participants for an overall total of 81.

Volleyball: The indoor women's volleyball program for 2018 had 89 participants, dropping three players from 92 in 2017.

Sand Volleyball: The sand volleyball league in 2018 had 28 participants, down from 29 participants in 2017. The Sand Dig Volleyball Tournament attracted 114 participants, up from 96 participants in 2017.

Wrestling: In 2004, the Petoskey Wrestling Associations and the City of Petoskey joined forces to offer an introductory wrestling program for area youth. This program in 2018 had 36 participants, down from 50 participants the previous season.

Bowling & Sailing: Both third year programs continue to grow in popularity. Bowling participation held strong at 15 participants and Sailing gained four participants, moving from 17 in 2017 to 21 in 2018.

Youth Volleyball: Another third year program in 2018 that remained steady, with participation totals of 48 in 2017 and 47 in 2018.

Disc Golf: The disc golf tournament attracted 46 participants in 2018, up 10 participants from 2017.

Program Recap: Participant numbers over the years have tended to be cyclic since 1987; numbers have varied from a low of 2,475 participants in 1988 to a high of 3,813 participants in 1995. Staff continues to attempt to capture statistics on all user groups utilizing recreational facilities provided by the City to gain a better perspective on participants being served, either through program fees or contracted league fees.

GENERAL RECREATION USAGE

The Department of Parks and Recreation continues to provide park and recreation facilities and support services to a number of recreational associations whose participants are not statistically tracked by staff. Partial lists of these programs include:

VISION & FUTURE ENDEAVORS

The Department of Parks and Recreation will continue to provide these quality programs at an affordable cost for all of its participants. The recently developed scholarship fund will help in that regard, offsetting a percentage of the program cost for youth participants in need of assistance. We are always adapting, exploring and searching for ways to improve existing programs. The Department will also be looking to add recreation programs/event in the future, including Lacrosse (in 2019), a disc golf league, a grass volleyball and cornhole tournament (ran in 2018 on a trial basis in unison with Festival on the Bay), pickle ball, Festival Area concerts and more. The Department is also looking at marketing trends, branching out into social media and exploring the development of an informational flyer that would be distributed to local households.

SUMMARY

The City's parks, facilities and recreational program offerings greatly contribute to our areas sense of place and the quality of life enjoyed by our residents and visitors. It is vital to the health of our community both economically and physically that our Parks be properly maintained and that our recreational program activities remain strong and viable. In order to insure their vitality, it is important that cooperation between our various governmental units, the college and the school district be maintained and expanded for the joint benefit of our shared constituents. It is also equally important that we maintain the support and backing of our citizens and continue to educate them on the important role that Parks and Recreation programs play in our community.

RECOMMENDATION: Review and consider approval of agreements

Background. The City of Petoskey and the Townships of Bear Creek and Resort have recognized the need for and the benefits of shared recreational programming and have entered into recreational agreements to provide this service for their respective residents for a number of years.

Provisions of these agreements state that all residents of Bear Creek and Resort Townships who participate in City provided or hosted recreational programs will not pay outside residency fees. In return, the townships share in the recreational program costs based upon the percentage of residents participating in the programs.

Overview. City staff has prepared standard agreements for 2019 based upon the actual program expenses and 2018 participation figures.

2019 Agreement Cost for ***Bear Creek Township***
based upon 26% participation **\$31,514**

2019 Agreement Cost for ***Resort Township***
based upon 14% participation **\$16,969**

A copy of each agreement is attached for review by the Commission. Commission will be asked to consider approval of the Township Agreements and recommend that the agreements be forwarded to the respective townships along with the 2018 Annual Participation Report.

PARTICIPATION AGREEMENT**

THIS AGREEMENT, made this _____ day of _____, 2019 by and between the City of Petoskey, a Michigan Municipal Corporation, 101 East Lake Street, Petoskey, Michigan, hereinafter referred to as "CITY", and the Township of Bear Creek, a Michigan Municipal Corporation, 373 Division Road, Petoskey, Michigan, hereinafter referred to as "TOWNSHIP", is in reference to the following:

WHEREAS, the CITY has, for a number of years, provided an extensive recreation program, both summer and winter, which a substantial number of TOWNSHIP residents have participated in; and

WHEREAS, CITY and TOWNSHIP recognize the merit of cost sharing in such recreation programs and TOWNSHIP desires to pay its fair share of the cost of such programs based on the amount of participation by TOWNSHIP residents;

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the participation of TOWNSHIP residents in the complete recreation program operated by the CITY, the parties agree as follows:

- (1) TOWNSHIP will pay to the CITY the sum of **\$31,514** payable to the City of Petoskey by July 1, 2019. (This sum is based on actual 2018 recreational revenues, expenses, and township participation levels).
- (2) TOWNSHIP residents, both children and adults, will have access to and may participate in all CITY recreation programs in the same manner as if they were residents of the CITY.
- (3) CITY will maintain records of participation for all recreation programs in 2019 as a basis for determining similar charges for 2019, but the TOWNSHIP is not obliged in any way to participate in any future years.

WHEREAS, the CITY has, for a number of years, provided an extensive recreation program, both summer and winter, which a substantial number of TOWNSHIP residents have participated in; and

WHEREAS, CITY and TOWNSHIP recognize the merit of cost sharing in such recreation programs and TOWNSHIP desires to pay its fair share of the cost of such programs based on the amount of participation by TOWNSHIP residents;

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the participation of TOWNSHIP residents in the complete recreation program operated by the CITY, the parties agree as follows:

- (1) TOWNSHIP will pay to the CITY the sum of **\$16,969** payable to the City of Petoskey by July 1, 2019. (This sum is based on actual 2018 recreational revenues, expenses and township participation levels)
- (2) TOWNSHIP residents, both children and adults, will have access to and may participate in all CITY recreation programs in the same manner as if they were residents of the CITY.
- (3) CITY will maintain records of participation for all recreation programs in 2019 as a basis for determining similar charges for 2019, but the TOWNSHIP is not obliged in any way to participate in any future years.

AGENDA SUBJECT: Begin Selection Process for the 2018 Glenn H. Casey Award

RECOMMENDATION: Review Nomination Process and Consider Potential Nominees

Background: In 1981, the “Glenn H. Casey” award was established to annually recognize a recreation volunteer who has exhibited an outstanding commitment to the City’s recreation program. **Al Hansen** was the recipient of the 2017 award, for his continuing dedication through his position as Director of Parks and Recreation. Al’s leadership spanned 29 years and affected thousands of users.

Past Recipients: A list of past recipients of the Glenn H. Casey Award are attached for informational purposes.

RECOMMENDATION: TIFA and Parks and Recreation Committee meet biannually

Information: Beginning January 1, 2019 the Recodified Tax Increment Financing Act (2018 PA 57) took effect. The Act has specific uniform reporting requirements on most authorities that include meeting biannually. Since the TIFA Board and Parks and Recreation Committee share common project goals, having two joint meetings annually makes the most sense.
